Join us on April 12 for the Victory Electric Cooperative Annual Meeting.

In accordance with Victory Electric's bylaws, each year the cooperative holds a meeting of the members to communicate the cooperative's activities and financial status for the past year. The meeting also brings the annual trustee election to a close. Members mail their votes prior to the meeting, and the results are announced at the meeting.

Purchasing electric power from Victory Electric gives you membership in the cooperative, and as a member, you have voting rights. Your participation is a fundamental power that flows from you to your electric cooperative. You have the power to discuss issues with friends and neighbors and elect your board representation. You have a voice in cooperative business affairs, the business you own. That democratic right — which includes one vote by every cooperative member – is one of several important differences between electric cooperatives and investor-owned electric utilities.

The strength of our cooperative comes from our members. Informed and concerned members stay involved by electing those people who value their way of life and work to improve the quality of life in southwest Kansas.

STRATEGIC MOVES

Much like a game of chess, we must always be thinking three moves ahead. Strategic thinking looks at the "big picture." Emergency alerts quickly declared by the Southwest Power Pool (SPP) forced many electric cooperatives into outages due to the inability of electric generation supply to meet demand. The SPP oversees the bulk electric transmission system (often referred to as "the grid") and manages the reliability for a 14-state region that includes Kansas. The SPP has never in its 80-plus year existence had to implement power curtailments and has never dealt with this extreme type of phenomenon. These energy emergency




INCUMBENT


VICTORY ELECTRIC DISTRICT MAP




2021 YOUTH TOUR SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

76TH ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS

The 76th Annual Meeting of Members of The Victory Electric Cooperative Assn., Inc., was held Tuesday, April 20, 2021, at the Western State Bank Expo in Dodge City. An abbreviated meeting was held with 120 members present and 150 in attendance. No meal was served.

The meeting began with the National Anthem followed with the invocation by Kirk Larson.

President Pat Morse called the meeting to order at 6 p.m., pursuant to a notice that was mailed to all members in accordance with cooperative bylaws. Morse declared a quorum.

Morse introduced Victory Electric's board of trustees and their spouses: Daryl Tieben, vicepresident, and Carol; Cedric Drewes, secretary/ treasurer, and Diane; Gary Gillespie and Kelly; Jim Imel; Terri Larson and Kirk; Jim Ochs and Debbie; Randy Quint and Lynne; Ken Schulte; Kenny Wehkamp; John Leis; CEO Shane Laws and Ali; and Dave Snapp, Victory Electric attorney.

Morse sought a motion to approve the 2020 meeting minutes. A motion was made, seconded and carried. Morse sought a motion to waive the reading of the official notice, affidavit of mailing, minutes of the nominating committee and report of the nominating committee. A motion was made, seconded and carried.

Morse introduced and thanked the members of the nominating committee.

Attorney Dave Snapp announced the results of the trustee election. All three board members were re-elected: District 1, Daryl Tieben; District 3, Ken Schulte; and District 8, Cedric Drewes.
