Visit the Apple App Store or the Google Play Store and search for "SmartHub" to download. Signing up is easy and fast, and you can start using it immediately.

Victory Electric's Top 10 Tips for Saving Energy

- 1. Replace any lightbulb, especially ones that burn more than one hour per day, with a light-emitting diode (LED) bulb.
- 2. Seal from the inside. Air sealing is an inexpensive way to lower energy costs and improve comfort. Seal gaps and holes in walls, floors, and ceilings with caulk or foam sealant. Look for cracks around windows and where wires and pipes pass through.
- 3. Plug electronic devices such as cable boxes, printers and TVs into power strips to turn off during vacations or long periods without use. Smart power strips make it an easy task to save money.
- 4. Close shades and drapes during the day to help keep your home cooler in the summer and warmer in the winter.

- 5. Change your central HVAC system filter when dirty according to the manufacturers recommendations. Dirty filters can impact your home comfort and increase your electricity bill.
- 6. A one degree increase on your thermostat when heating or decrease in cooling can increase energy use by 3-5%.
- Have your duct work checked for leaks. Leaks at the return, air handler and supply can be a major source of high bills. Mobile homes check at the grill, cross over duct and down flow air handler, for leaks.
- 8. Set both the upper and lower water heater thermostats no higher than 120 degrees.
- An electric space heater can cost more than \$100 per month to operate. Minimize their use, except for limited or temporary spot heating. Turn space heaters off when leaving
- 10. Ensure refrigerator door seals are tight. Eliminate unnecessary refrigerators.

All linemen seek to achieve the highest classification in their field by becoming a journeyman lineman. Recently, Victory Electric's operations department recognized MARLON

for completing his journeyman lineman certificate.

Hernandez-Gonzalez, a Dodge City local, enrolled in the electrical power technology program at Dodge City Community College shortly after graduating high school.

"Originally, I thought the program was supposed to be training for indoor electrician jobs. One day, they sent us outside and had us start learning how to climb poles and I liked it," Hernandez-Gonzalez said.

After completing his training in 2015, Hernandez-Gonzalez began interning with Victory Electric. Following his internship, Hernandez-Gonzalez moved to Wichita to work at Westar Energy. In 2016, he returned to Victory full-time as a fourth-class lineman.

During his five years with the cooperative, Hernandez-Gonzalez has never shied away from working extra hours or "climbing" the extra mile. Aside from picking up additional on-call shifts, he is a frequent volunteer at company events.

"Whether it's driving a line truck in a parade, overseeing the go-carts at the pumpkin festival, or greeting members at annual meeting, Marlon is always there when you need him," said Jerri Whitley, vice president of communications.

"You definitely have to put in the work to become a journeyman. Getting the promotion is great, but it helps to have people in your corner to motivate you and remind you what going out and 'getting this bread' is for," Hernandez-Gonzalez said.

For Hernandez-Gonzalez, those people are his mother, Guadalupe, his girlfriend, Adriana, and their son, Santana, who was born in April. In his free time, he enjoys spending time with his family and friends.

Linemen will tell you working on a line crew is a brotherhood, and earning the journeyman title requires dedication and a concentrated effort. Each lineman has their own source of motivation and their paths to becoming a journeyman are all different. With the addition of Hernandez-Gonzalez, Victory Electric now has a total of 21 journeymen linemen.

"Becoming a journeyman lineman ensures lineworkers are qualified, independent and can supervise a crew," said Ryan Miller, vice president of operations. "We are excited to add another one to the crew."
