## **Grant Funds to Boost Grid Resiliency**

Victory Electric trustees, staff and employees stay informed about trends affecting the electric utility industry and seek innovative strategies to meet our current and

future energy needs. The cooperative prioritizes decisions that align with the interests of the local communities we serve while providing reliable, affordable energy to the region.

Researching and applying for grants is one strategy we use to reach that goal. Grant funding allows us to avoid longterm debt and its associated interest expense. This helps the cooperative save money and maintain lower rates for our members.

In 2024, Victory Electric was approved for a grid resiliency grant to improve infrastructure in Dodge City. The U.S. Department of Energy, the Kansas Corporation Commission and the Build Kansas Fund are jointly investing over \$2.1 million in this project, which involves the installation of approximately 225 TripSaver devices on single-phase taps throughout the Dodge City area.

#### **DEVICES WILL REDUCE OUTAGES**

Up to 80% of the faults on a power

system are temporary problems caused by weather, wildlife or vegetation. A fuse is a single-use device that protects a section of power line and prevents the outage from affecting many other services upstream. When a problem on the line occurs and blows a fuse,

the line loses power until a worker is able to travel to the location and replace it.

A TripSaver device acts as a programmable smart fuse that protects the system from faults and prevents longer outages. If a problem occurs on a line with a TripSaver installed, the device will de-energize the line for a brief period of time, then re-energize it. This resolves the temporary fault and keeps the power flowing, and members experience a blink in power rather than an outage.

TripSaver devices have been shown to reduce the total number and length of outages. Victory Electric anticipates a large decrease in outages with these devices, which will improve infrastructure resiliency and reliability, especially in south Dodge City. The devices will be especially useful when trees get into power lines or high winds cause lines to slap together. In addition to the

# Student Leaders Connect in Washington, D.C.

**BECCA DURLER** and BAILEE BRADFORD received an allexpenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C., for the Electric Cooperative Youth Tour this summer. The two area students traveled with 27 other delegates from Kansas and four from Hawaii on an action-packed trip June

14-20. Victory Electric Business Intelligence Analyst **BRENT NAU** and his wife. **DESIREE**, also accompanied the group as chaperones.

Brent said he was impressed by the way the students shared more about themselves with other youth and made meaningful connections during their travels together. "Seeing the monuments and memorials was great, but the best part for me was seeing how the kids meshed together. The real memories were the friendships that were forged by the kids," he said.

Making connections with other youth is key to the annual Youth Tour's success. Since the late 1950s, the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's Youth Tour has been developing young leaders by bringing high school students from around the country to Washington, D.C. More than 2,000 youth delegates, chaperones and staff from 44 states visited the nation's capital this year.

"Something that inspired me on this trip was all the other delegates," Bradford said of her experience. "I love all of them, and they have all inspired me to become a better person, live life to the fullest and be a leader. Most of all, I have learned

that no one is perfect and we all have flaws that make us special."

The Hawaii-Kansas delegation learned about historical figures and events during tours of Arlington National Cemetery, which included the Changing of the Guard ceremony; national monuments and memorials; the National Portrait Gallery and other Smithsonian museums; and a new educational museum, The People's House: A White House Experience. Students had the opportunity to speak to a Holocaust survivor while touring the U.S. Holocaust Museum. They also had a dinner cruise on

the Potomac River, watched a Washington Nationals baseball game, and attended a production of "Les Misérables" at John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

Kansas Youth Tour delegates met with U.S. Sen. Roger Marshall and Jason Morganti, a legislative assistant for U.S. Rep. Ron Estes, at the U.S. Capitol. Before traveling to Washington, D.C., Kansas delegates also toured the Kansas State Capitol in Topeka with State Treasurer Steven Johnson and Kansas Rep. Kyle Hoffman, both Youth Tour alumni.

Youth Day brought all the state delegations together to connect with other students, hear motivational speakers and learn about electric cooperatives and careers in the electric industry. The Kansas and Hawaii delegations also joined their peers from Colorado and Wyoming for a leadership workshop and learned about U.S. flag etiquette from Sgt. 1st Class Phillip Reddick with the U.S. Coast Guard.



# Meadowlark House, SKDC 10-33 Foundation Receive CoBank Funding

Victory Electric congratulates Meadowlark House Child Advocacy Center and the Southwest Kansas-Dodge City 10-33 Foundation for each winning a 2025 CoBank Sharing Success grant.

After evaluating the applications of 21 nonprofit organizations from our service area, the Victory Electric Board of Trustees selected **MEADOWLARK HOUSE** to receive a \$23,000 grant and the **SKDC 10-33 FOUNDATION** to receive a \$7,000 grant, based on the amounts the organizations requested in their grant proposals.

This annual grant opportunity is made possible by Victory Electric in partnership with CoBank, whose \$6 million Sharing Success fund matches customer donations to charities across rural America. CoBank's maximum grant award was raised to \$15,000 per year in 2025 and is matched by Victory Electric for a total of \$30,000 available to one or more selected recipients.

#### **MEADOWLARK HOUSE**

Meadowlark House Child Advocacy Center provides a supportive, child-friendly sanctuary for kids who have experienced abuse and neglect. Meadlowlark House's services help reduce the trauma children face when sharing their abuse experiences with advocates and other professionals.

"We work closely with law enforcement, social services, medical personnel, and mental health professionals to create a coordinated response that prioritizes the well-being of the child," Jill Henrichs, coordinator, noted in the grant application.

Meadowlark House coordinates with outside agencies to conduct forensic interviews that are tailored to children's age and developmental level. The coordinated services help protect children from further harm and ensure those responsible for hurting them can be held accountable. Meadowlark House also provides legal advocacy, locates safe housing when needed, and offers referrals for medical providers and mental health therapists who specialize in treating trauma.

CoBank Sharing Success Grant funding will be used to obtain and implement the Guardify Systems platform for conducting secure forensic interviews and to better coordinate Meadowlark House's child advocacy services while ensuring compliance with state and federal regulations. The system will streamline case management, improve data security, and enable seamless collaboration among child welfare professionals, law enforcement and legal entities.

There is a pressing need for Meadowlark House's services. In 2023 and 2024, the organization served 133 children across nine counties.

#### **SKDC 10-33 FOUNDATION**

The Southwest Kansas-Dodge City 10-33 Foundation provides crisis support, training and education to first responders, military personnel, communities and their families in rural Kansas. Law enforcement officers and other first responders experience a significant number of traumatic events during their careers. The group's mission is to serve those who protect others when they need support themselves.

Staffed by current and former first responders, military members and their family members, the group of "first responders to first responders" took its name from the radio code for "officer in distress." The 10-33 Foundation was formed in 2012, and the local team launched in 2023.

The SKDC 10-33 Foundation will use grant funds for crisis training, including a three-day Critical Incident Stress Management course in the fall for area first responders, school personnel and community volunteers to learn strategies for responding to trauma and critical incidents.

"At the 10-33 Foundation, we are dedicated to giving back and building communities that are strong, resilient and never alone. This grant plays a crucial role in making that vision a reality," said SKDC 10-33 Peer Support Team Lead Summer Rhodes.

The demand for the group to provide community mass briefings, critical incident defusings, debriefings and one-on-one crisis interventions continues to grow in the region.

improvement in Dodge City's quality of electric service, the grant-funded resiliency project will reduce the overall cost associated with repairing outages by decreasing the number of service calls required to investigate a single-phase outage and/or replace a blown fuse.

## PROJECT DEPLOYMENT BEGINS SOON

Installation of the first batch of TripSaver devices is expected to begin this summer. Victory Electric estimates the project will be completed by fall 2028. The installation will be completed in stages and include several structural re-

placements, further increasing resiliency throughout the project area. We have been working with Sunflower Electric Power Corporation for cost analysis and other research to determine the best device placement, equipment coordination and optimal programming settings.

We're excited about this resiliency grant and how the project will benefit our member-owners and the Dodge City region. The project and the funds awarded will improve the resilience of our local energy infrastructure, enabling us to provide a more reliable and stable system for the entire community.

Resilient electrical systems recover

more quickly from disruptions that might diminish the quality or continuity of electricity supply. Improving grid resiliency ensures that the communities Victory Electric serves will remain powered when problems occur. It also boosts the economic stability of regions by preventing prolonged power outages that disrupt businesses.
