

Not us! Our online Kid's Korner is way cool!


Did you know we have a Web module designed just for kids? Go to www.victoryelectric.net to find a lively tour of where energy comes from, how it's made, how we use it, and how we can save it.

Kid's Korner is geared for kids 3rd through 5th grade (though we know lots of adults who love it, too!) The site uses diagrams, games, and experiments to make energy come alive. Here's a sample of what the site includes-so kids can click, learn and have fun:

For parents, there are also several energy savings calculators that can help you determine where in your house you can conserve energy. For example, the HomeEnergyCalculator is a quick, one-screen form asks about a dozen questions about your

home. Simply click to indicate your home's approximate square footage, age, number of occupants, fuel type, and several other variables. Then hit "calculate" to get an estimate of the monthly and annual energy use and costs for your house.

Once you've gotten a feel for your home's energy costs and what various changes might save, it's time to take a big-picture look at overall home energy usage. Click the "chart" button and you'll see a pie chart with the percentage break-down of total annual energy use by appliance or system type.

In addition to the HomeEnergy-Calculator, there is also a commercial energy calculator and several special purpose calculators including, irrigation, CFL, commercial lighting, space heaters, and tv's.
