

Who We Are

The Victory Electric Cooperative Association, Inc., is your local electric cooperative. We pride ourselves in the service we provide to our members. As a member of the cooperative, you are an owner of the utility, and therefore you have a voting membership. We invite you to come to our Annual Meeting on April 12, 2011, and participate in the meeting.

Victory Electric was first chartered June 1, 1945, the first lines were energized in August 1947, and our cooperative's name comes from the recognition of the US and Allied forces' victory at the end of World War II.

In the early days, the cooperative served in parts of nine counties with just over 300 miles of transmission and distribution line.

Today, Victory Electric is

headquartered in Dodge City in Ford County. We have 80 employees and provide electric service to 19,000 meters/members with over 2,700 miles of transmission and distribution line in southwest Kansas. The majority of our service area is within the four counties of Ford, Gray, Hodgeman and Finney counties. Other counties partially served are Clark, Edwards, Haskell, Kiowa and Meade counties.

Victory Electric is a member-owner in companies utilizing a variety of energy resources, including wind, coal, natural gas, hydroelectric and nuclear. In addition, new coal and wind generation projects are currently in planning stages. We're committed to developing generation capabilities in an environmentally responsible manner, while insuring a reliable energy supply at a reasonable cost.

Victory Electric's employees and Board of Trustees have derived a culture statement. It is based upon integrity, honesty, loyalty and accountability, with benevolence to each other and our members. 

Terry Janson, general manager, Dave Snapp, attorney for Victory Electric, and Rae Jean Amy, who recorded the minutes, were also present. Dave Snapp called the meeting to order at 1 p.m.

Thereupon, Dave Snapp went over qualifications and eligibility requirements for election as a trustee, as set forth in the bylaws of the cooperative, to determine if each potential nominee was eligible for election based upon the information available and the bylaws of the cooperative.

Thereupon, motions duly made, voted on and carried, Rolland Werner was elected as chairman of the nominating committee. Thereupon, Chairman Werner asked for nominations for the position of Secretary and Inspector of Elections. It was moved, seconded and motion carried to nominate Greg Hainer as Secretary and Inspector of Elections. The President and General Manager's Report

Victory Electric Cooperative would like to invite you to our 66th Annual Meeting of the cooperative. This year's meeting will be held on April 12, 2011, at the Dodge City Civic Center at 2110 First Avenue, Dodge City. Registration will start at 5:30 p.m., dinner will be served at 6 p.m. and the business meeting at 7 p.m. We will be giving a cobalt blue cake pan to the first 600 members who register at the annual meeting. We will also be giving away other great prizes throughout the meeting.

Victory Electric had a very busy year in 2010. Not only were we busy with day-to-day operations, but we were also rebuilding power lines from two major ice storms that occurred in 2006 and 2007. We completed a major rebuild project at the end of 2010, and we'll complete the second rebuild project in 2011.

We saw an increase in growth of 3.8 percent in kWh sales and a growth of 5.4 percent in new services. The increase in revenue of \$8,505,955 was attributed to a very hot summer and a rate increase that was put into effect in February of 2010.

Victory Electric is experiencing positive growth, which can be attributed to a strong economy in western Kansas and a strong agricultural region. The new Boot Hill Casino & Resort that opened in Dodge City in December 2009, had a very successful first year of operation. Also, the new Special Events Center, next to the Boot Hill Casino & Resort, just opened and will start providing entertainment to

the region. This kind of entertainment was only available before with at least a three hour drive or longer. In addition, we several new small businesses have opened. Housing, or lack thereof, has never been more important than it is right now and will continue to be an issue to address in the future. And with some large businesses looking at the region, it will only continue to drive the need for housing. This is a very complex issue that is being addressed with new apartment buildings, duplexes and homes being built not only in Dodge City but also in the other cities in our service area. Victory Electric is working hard to ensure we have the infrastructure in place to accommodate that growth in Dodge City and throughout our service territory. We anticipate with the increased growth in new businesses in the next few years, several hundred new jobs will be coming to Dodge City and the surrounding area.

We continue to work hard to bring a new coal-fired power plant to western Kansas. It is our belief that this is the most cost effective base-load generation resource we can build to support the energy needs of our members into the future. We continue to add non base-load generation resources, such as wind, into our generation mix. Our generation and transmission company, Sunflower Electric, of which Victory owns about 17 percent, is also looking at other types of base-load generation. Sunflower is not only looking at coal, but also at nuclear and any other genera-

tion that makes sense and is cost effective. Sunflower received an air permit at the end of 2010 from the Kansas Department of Health & Environment but faces lawsuits and other obstacles from those that would like to see the project fail. However, Victory will persevere and continue to move forward to do what's best for our members by producing the cheapest, safest and most reliable power that can be produced. Our other generation and transmission company, KEPCo, just added another 30 MW of coal generation to their fleet in the late fall of 2010. All that being said, we are seeing more cost increases from the demand side component of billing. KEPCo just implemented a demand cost adjustment (DCA) to their power cost as a pass through along with an energy cost adjustment (ECA), which was implemented many years ago as a pass through. Many other utilities around the country are looking to establish billing adjustments that are demand-side based, because as

excess base-load generation is depleted, it will create more stress on the price of peaking demand cost. We will probably be seeing more cost added to our power bills in the future. One of those adders could be a transmission adder because of all the transmission that will need to be built for renewable energy sources. Ultimately, the transmission lines will need to be paid for and the consumer will be charged for them. Another adder will probably be an environmental adder to pay for the cost of modifying older generation resources with new emission equipment technology so they are up to current environmental standards.

Victory continues to believe the most important service we offer is service itself. We believe that even though we are a small company, we still have a responsibility to our members and ourselves to create an environment of principal and integrity. This may not always be easy for Victory or our members, but we strive to treat all

equally and fairly. We believe that to adhere to this higher standard, we must all be responsible and hold ourselves, and each other, accountable. It's easy for any Victory member to talk to a real person on the phone without having to navigate through an automated system. A person will answer who can talk to you about your concerns and give you the customer service that you deserve. Victory offers the best employees who care about you and your problems and work hard to take care of your needs. Remember, you are Victory Electric, and everything we do revolves around you and the service we can provide you. That service will continue far into the future.

We look forward to seeing you at our Annual Meeting on April 12th, so please plan on attending and have a steak dinner on us as a special thank you for the best members a company could have. Have a great 2011!



65th Annual Meeting Minutes

of The Victory Electric Cooperative Association., Inc. April 6, 2010

The 65th Annual Meeting of Members of The Victory Electric Cooperative Assn., Inc., was held on Tuesday, April 6, 2010, at the Civic Center in Dodge City, beginning at 7 p.m. The meeting followed a BBQ dinner served to 336 members and guests for a total of approximately 575 meals served.

The meeting began with The National Anthem sung by the Dodge City High School Madrigals. Orlando Jantz gave the invocation. President Richard Lightner called the 65th Annual Meeting to order at 7:05 p.m., pursuant to a notice to all members that was mailed in accordance with the bylaws of the cooperative, and declared a quorum was present. President Lightner asked for a motion to approve the minutes of last year's meeting. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes as mailed. The motion carried. He asked Secretary-Treasurer Carl Hubbell to read the Official Notice and Affidavit of Mailing. Secretary-

Hubbell asked if there were any questions on the financials posted in the notice booklet. There were none.

Jerry King, director of marketing and communications, introduced last year's Youth Tour winners: Carissa Hodgs, Ingalls; Megan Hood, Bucklin; Britnie Jenkins, Cimarron; and Savannah Dwyre, Ingalls. All four of the young ladies gave a brief presentation on their respective trips. King then intro-

Steamboat Springs trip was Kate Lock from Cimarron, and Vanessa Nuñez from Dodge City. President Lightner introduced Victory Electric's Board of Trustees and their spouses: Kenny Wehkamp and Ivy, vice-president; Carl Hubbell and Jane, secretary/treasurer; Cedric Drewes and Diane, Loren Ochs and Kay, Max Jantz, John Leis and Jill, Milam Jones and Beulah, Kenneth Schulte and Gwen, Pat Morse and Shannon, Daryl Tieben and Carol, Dave Snapp, Victory Electric attorney; and himself, Richard Lightner, serving as president.

Victory Electric general manager, Terry Janson, introduced the guests who were present: Stuart Lowry, executive vice-president with Kansas Electric Cooperatives, Inc.; Steve Parr, executive vice-president, and Les Evans, senior VP and chief operating officer, both with KEPCo; Earl Watkins, CEO, Nikki Pfannenstiel, member services coordinator, and Abby McGreevy, communications

specialist, all with Sunflower Electric; Senator Tim Huelskamp from the 38th District; Dow Morris, assistant manager, and Bob Venters, manager of member services, both from Lane Scott Electric. He also introduced Victory retirees Betty McCosh, Richard Flax, Dean Harms, Marvin Hampton and John Durler.

Dave Snapp, Victory Electric attorney, stepped to the podium. He explained the proposed bylaw change. With no questions, President Lightner entertained a motion. It was moved and seconded to accept the bylaw change as proposed. The motion carried.

President Lightner asked for a report from the Nominating Committee. Robert Carlson, Inspector of Elections of the Nominating Committee, gave the report of the Nominating Committee. 

Where They Come From







Property Taxes - Paid in the Last Five Years




Capital Credits - Allocated in the Last Five Years


